

Should Pastors Be Paid?

He boldly offered up the idea that no where in scripture does it say or imply that Pastors, Deacons, Elders, etc. should or can be financially paid to do the work of the ministry...I leave it to the reader of this short study paper to reach their own conclusions.

Is it Scripturally Acceptable for Pastors, Deacons and/or Elders and staff to be financially compensated for their work in the ministry?

The New Testament contains various passages that discuss the financial support of religious leaders and workers, including pastors or ministers.
